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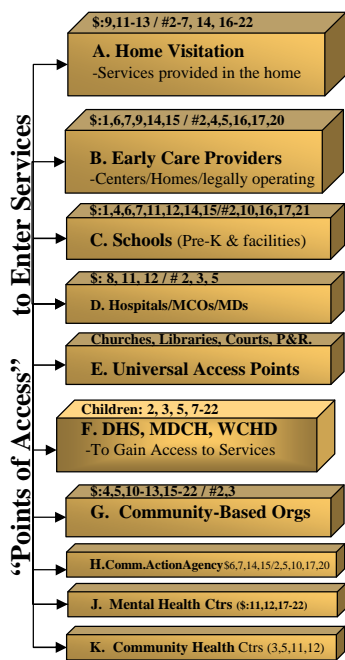

### Where Are Children and Families Served?



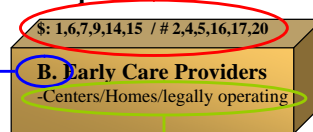
**Access Points for Children and Families:** These are “doors” through which a child and/or family can access a diverse array of services. The collection of boxes at the left represent a comprehensive inventory of the ways in which services are made accessible to families and children through the stages of pre-birth through age five. While most early care and education activities occur in the home, “At Home Child Rearing” is not included here but instead found in the Parenting Education box for the service areas. These access points represent tangible resource and formal organizational entities such as early care and education (aka child care) providers, schools, and other major actors contributing to the development of all children.

Each of these access points provide valuable - often critical - service to children and families. They are each listed in order to identify the populations they effect, the institutional funding streams (such as Medicaid, TANF and WIC) they are eligible to receive and, for the purposes of creating a more unified and sustainable child development system, to highlight the special functions and contributions they make to the quality of life for children and families across Wayne County. It is important to note that not all of the identified Access Points across the county provide the same services to the same cohort of children as other providers in their category. In fact, it is often rare that they do. Conversely, there are examples of providers around the county who serve some children that their categorical counterparts do not. For example, community-based organizations (CBOs) across Wayne vary a great deal in the number and type of children and families they serve.

**How to use this section:** Each three-dimensional box contains an identification of the type of physical facility providing services to children and a formal identification of the programs they offer and, therefore, the types of children/families receiving their services.

These capital letters provide an identifier for quick referral to the specified access point within other sections and boxes in the system map. For example, at the bottom of the “Who is Served” page, a list of Access Points is listed for each eligibility category.

A brief breakdown of the major types of providers within the larger category

These numbers refer to the numbers assigned various programs in the “Who is Served?” section. This serves as a key for not only documenting the types of children and families accessing services at these locations by association with eligibility, but to also facilitate the identification of major institutional funding streams that many of these Access Points receive. The “/” sign serves to differentiate the funding streams that come directly to the Access Point and those programs that might be conducted with the access point as host or partner, but not a direct recipient of funding.
